Dear Family!

Reflection: Christmas for Christians is a day of gratitude. Gratitude leads us to prayer, where our hearts are filled with wonder and praise. Christmas leads us to the sense of wonder. God presents himself as tiny, fragile, vulnerable, and dependent. Compared to the strong, muscular, powerful, parenting and patronizing people we are in front of God.

We often see parents and friends finding similarities between the child and parents. This child Jesus not just resembles certain features, rather is the ultimate replica of God the Father. This child is not a super child in any way: it cries, disturbs the parents middle of the night, and also smiles beautifully, holds our finger tight, kicks with both the legs to show excitement. He is confused, anxious, and fearful, always in need of the warmth of the mother. Christmas makes us wonder in a new way. God so weak and vulnerable is asleep with his creation which is strong and powerful.

If there is no Christmas, we would not have experienced this sense of wonder at all: we would have missed touching his soft little cheeks, fingers and toes; missed to see him sleep peacefully, see him cry, see him reach out to him mom, his confused looks and his innocence. This brings in a great lesson of all time: to reach at the cave of one's heart, one must become childlike. A child has a great power to draw our attention completely. God not only became childlike, but God also became a child. This proves that God will go all the way, take any risk, sacrifice any level, and give up anything to reach the cave of our hearts.

How do we stand near the Nativity Scene? What goes on in our minds and hearts as we see this child in the manger? I too want others to know that I can be liked, loved and I want others to know that I can love affectionately too. Do I see others as lovable and wanting to be loved? Am I ready to present myself lovable; childlike? Christmas is indeed tenderness for the past, courage for the present and hope for the future. I wish you all Merry Christmas!

EUCHARIST REVIVAL TALK

Fr. Gilbert Starcher was our guest speaker for the Eucharistic Revival lecture series on Wednesday December 13, 2023. He started off with the hymn O Sacrum Convivium or O Sacred Banquet, which is a title of a text of St. Thomas Aquinas rejoicing in the fact that we encounter Christ's saving love in the Eucharist: Holy Communion. Traditionally it is a prayer honoring the blessed sacrament. What are the effects of receiving the Eucharist? We can receive eternal life if we stay close to Jesus in this sacrament. Jesus enters our souls; he cleanses us of past sin and preserves us from future sin. Reference Gospel of St. John 6:48-59, I am the bread of life.....When we receive the body of Christ, he stays with us for about 15 minutes, we receive the graces of deepening our union with Christ, separating us from sin and strengthening our charity.

Sacraments Summary: Eternal sacraments are Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Orders.

Holy Eucharist lasts 15 minutes, Matrimony lasts until the death of a spouse, Anointing of the sick lasts until death or the recovery from an illness, Reconciliation until another mortal sin is committed. So, we are most closely united to Jesus through the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Our blessed mother had a profound sacrificial love for God. The 7 sorrows of Mary are a window in sharing of her suffering. We should strive to live life like the Virgin Mary so we can progress to holiness.

ST. MARK BIBLE STUDY RECAP OF 12-13-23

This lesson focused on the Triumph Over Death, Unbelief at Nazareth, the Mission of the Twelve and the Beheading of John the Baptist.

The following reflections are from *The Gospel of Mark by Mary Healy*.

- The Raising of Jairus's Daughter is the climax of a series of miracles. Each one increasingly reveals Jesus' power to overcome death. He has rescued His disciples from near-certain death on the storm on the lake, delivered a man whose existence was living death as he was possessed by demons, restored to health a hemorrhaging woman whose life was draining away and raised a dead girl to life. In each case the way to experience Jesus' saving power is to reject fear and yield to faith, a deeply personal faith that comes into living contact with Jesus Christ. The Evangelist, Mark, is preparing his readers to grasp the magnitude of Jesus' ultimate conquest of death in His resurrection, the prelude to the resurrection of all believers to eternal life.
- The episode of Unbelief at Nazareth reveals the "extraordinary ordinariness" of the Son of God. Jesus lived a life so lowly, unassuming and unremarkable that the possibility that the omnipotent God was present in Him was simply incomprehensible to many who knew Him. He was rejected not only by neighbors and friends, but also by family. It is not the first time that the lowly ways of God have perplexed and disconcerted His people. Isaiah had prophesied a Suffering Servant of God who, before His great work of atonement, would grow up unrecognized in the midst of the people. God has always sought to identify with us and desired His work of redemption, the reconciliation of humanity with Himself, to come not from without but from within; our Redeemer is one with us.
- During the Mission of the Twelve Jesus summoned the Apostles and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over unclean spirits. He instructed them to take nothing for the journey, but a walking stick. A stick or staff is a biblical symbol for authority. The lack of a sack meant that they could not even accept provisions from others for the journey. Because the apostles were occupying themselves with God's work, the exchange was that God would occupy Himself with their daily needs and they learned to totally rely on God! Their bare simplicity of life would help them stay free of distraction and focus wholly on their mission to preach the Kingdom of God. Their job was to carry out their mission obediently; success is in the hand of God as no one can be compelled to accept their message. Yet their message, like that of Jesus, carries authority; it is accompanied by works of power that serve as visible signs of confirming its truth.
- The Beheading of John the Baptist is the only sustained narrative in Mark's Gospel that is not directly about Jesus. Herod's actions show the snowball effect of unchecked sin, a common biblical theme. From adultery, Herod progressed to debauchery and ultimately, via his rash oaths, to murder. Like Pilate, later in the Gospel, Herod holds no malice toward his victim, yet cowardice and excessive concern for his own reputation lead him to bloodshed. Each player in this drama is complicit in the evil; Herod's scheming wife, Herodias, her lascivious daughter, Salome, the ruthlessly efficient executioner, and even Herod's dissipated guests, who raise no protest against the death of the innocent. Similarly, all the players in the Passion of Jesus, and by extension, all of sinful humanity are complicit in the death of the Son of God. Jesus, like John, will meet His end because He confronts people with the hard but beneficial truth about God's claim on our lives and the call to repentance, which is the doorway to salvation!

MEMORIALS AND FEASTS THIS WEEK

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT (Dec 24 Sunday)

December 25 - Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord

Why did the Word become flesh?

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (456-460, 466),

456 With the Nicene Creed, we answer by confessing: "For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven; by the power of the Holy Spirit, he became incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and was made man."

457 The Word became flesh for us *in order to save us by reconciling us with God*, who "loved us and sent his Son to be the expiation for our sins": "the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world", and "he was revealed to take away sins".

458 The Word became flesh so *that thus we might know God's love*: "In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him." "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

December 26 - Memorial of Saint Stephen, the First Martyr

"On the day after Christmas the liturgy has us celebrate the "birth into Heaven" of the first martyr, St Stephen. "Full of faith and of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 6:5), he was chosen as deacon in the Community of Jerusalem, together with another six disciples of Greek origin. Stephen worked numerous miracles with the power that came to him from God and proclaimed the Gospel in the synagogues with "inspired wisdom". He was stoned to death outside the city gates and died like Jesus, praying for forgiveness for those who killed him (see Acts 7: 59-60). The deep bond which links Christ to his first martyr Stephen is divine Charity: the very Love which impelled the Son of God to empty himself and make himself obedient unto death on a Cross (see Phil 2: 6-8) later spurred the Apostles and martyrs to give their lives for the Gospel." (Pope Benedict XVI - Angelus on Dec 26th, 2007)

December 27 - Feast of Saint John, Apostle and Evangelist

"The first thing St. John helps us to grasp is the reality of the Incarnation. St. John was writing to Christians at a time of the Gnostic (docetist) heresy that believed that all matter was evil and hence taught that God could have never assumed matter to himself. Therefore, they taught that Jesus only appeared to have a body but was more like a disincarnate ghost. He only appeared to be wrapped in swaddling clothes. He only appeared to eat. He couldn't have given us his body and blood to consume because he didn't have real body and blood. For the Gnostics, the incarnation was a philosophical impossibility. St. John wrote underlining the sensible reality of the Incarnation. He said, "What was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we looked upon and touched with our hands concerning the Word of life, for the life was made visible, we have seen it and testify to it." During these days of Christmas, it's key for us to use the senses God gave us to grow in faith."(Fr. Roger Landry)
