

THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Dear Family!

This Sunday is the second last Sunday of the church year. The following Sunday we will celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The readings logically speak about the 'last things' (Eschatology) - The Coming Day of the Lord, the Divine Judge. For us Catholic Christians, the end of the world is not God losing control of the earth, rather God bringing things to a triumphant end.

Malachi warns of the coming day of the Lord, when the proud and evildoers will be consumed, but the sun of justice will rise for those who fear God. Malachi in the mid-fifth century chided the leaders for their religious impiety, dishonesty. Prophet Malachi's encouraging words for the faithful who continue to be bring goodness in all they do - God's compassion will always be on them especially in the day of judgment. Malachi is the last book of the Old Testament, the Lord's final word that he will send Elijah to give them one last chance at conversion before the Day of the Lord brings Final Judgment.

In the Gospel we have Luke's version of the Apocalyptic discourse. The whole purpose of this style of literature, which is filled with imagery and symbolism, is to make us assured that if we remain constant in Faith, we could welcome the end of all things and the beginning of eternity with confidence and joy rather than with fear and dread. Jesus demands of his followers tenacity of Faith and Hope in spite of their sufferings.

As the Catechism points us out "Before Christ's second coming the Church must pass through a final trial that will shake the faith of many believers. The persecution that accompanies her pilgrimage on earth will unveil the "mystery of iniquity" in the form of a religious deception offering men an apparent solution to their problems at the price of apostasy from the truth. The supreme religious deception is that of the Antichrist, a pseudo-messianism by which man glorifies himself in place of God and of his Messiah come in the flesh. The Church will enter the glory of the kingdom only through this final Passover, when she will follow her Lord in his death and Resurrection. (CCC 675,677)

Today (33rd Sunday) is the World Day of the Poor:

Why Pope Francis established this day in 2017? After the Year of Mercy, the pope said he wanted to set aside a day so that, throughout the world, Christian communities could become even greater signs of Christ's charity for those in need. We are called, Pope Francis wrote in his first World Day of the Poor message, "to draw near to the poor, to encounter them, to meet their gaze, to embrace them, and to let them feel the warmth of love that breaks through their solitude. Their outstretched hand is also an invitation to step out of our certainties and comforts, and to acknowledge the value of poverty in itself." The pope said that for Christ's disciples, "poverty is, above all, a call to follow Jesus in his own poverty," and he asked Catholics to take as their example Saint Francis of Assisi, who kept his gaze fixed on Christ, allowing him to see and serve the poor.

Please pray for the Holy Spirit in choosing our next Bishop. The College of Consultors will fulfill their Canonical Duty and elect a Diocesan Administrator on Thursday Morning (Nov 20th). The Administrator will run the diocese till we get a new Bishop.

AI and Medicine: The Challenge of Human Dignity - Pope LEO (11-10-2025)

My good wishes to all in the International Congress entitled "AI and Medicine: The Challenge of Human Dignity." The digital revolution is playing a central role in shaping what Pope Francis referred to as an "epochal change." We are currently witnessing a time of new technological advancement that is comparable to the Industrial Revolution in some respects but is more pervasive. It heavily influences the way we think, altering our understanding of situations and how we perceive ourselves and others. We currently interact with machines as if they were interlocutors and thus become almost an extension of them. We not only run the risk of losing sight of the faces of the people around us, but of forgetting how to recognize and cherish all that is truly human.

The technological development has brought, and continues to bring, significant benefits to humanity, particularly in the fields of medicine and health. In order to ensure true progress, it is imperative that human dignity and the common good remain resolute priorities for all, both individuals and public entities. It is easy to recognize the destructive potential of technology and even medical research when they are placed at the service of antihuman ideologies. Historical events stand as a warning: the instruments at our disposal today are even more powerful and can produce a still more devastating effect on the lives of individuals and peoples.

However, if harnessed and placed at the true service of the human person, these effects can also be transformative and beneficial. I consider your dedication to exploring the potential of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in medicine to be of great significance. The fragility of the human condition is often manifest within the field of medicine, but we must never forget the "ontological dignity that belongs to the person as such simply because he or she exists and is willed, created, and loved by God". For this very reason, "healthcare professionals have the vocation and responsibility to be guardians and servants of human life," especially in its most vulnerable stages. The same can also be said of those who are responsible for the use of AI in this field. Indeed, the greater the fragility of human life, the greater the nobility required of those entrusted with its care.

Medical professionalism, in fact, requires not only the necessary specific expertise, but also the ability to communicate and be close to others. It can never be reduced merely to solving a problem. Similarly, technological devices must never detract from the personal relationship between patients and healthcare providers. Indeed, if AI is to serve human dignity and the effective provision of healthcare, we must ensure that it truly enhances both interpersonal relationships and the care provided.

Given the vast economic interests often at stake in the fields of medicine and technology, and the subsequent fight for control, it is essential to promote a broad collaboration among all those working in health care and politics that extends well beyond national borders. With these sentiments, please know, dear friends, of my prayers that this Conference will bear abundant fruit for you, your colleagues and the many people who will benefit from your competent and generous commitment. I thank you all and invoke upon you and your families the Blessing of Almighty God.

We now need a new boiler to heat the Mercy Hall Building so we can continue holding events and to bring our Faith Formation back to Mercy Hall. Along with heating the Mercy Hall building, we need to repair the side doors of the church. They have seen better days and have helped us along the way. They have become rusted out and now do not close easily or properly. On one side the glass has been damaged and needs replacement. We are asking for this Pastors Appeal to cover the cost of the boiler and doors. The price we are challenged with is \$125,000.00. NOTICIAS EN ESPAÑOL DEL ESCRITORIO DEL P. ANTONY

33° DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO

¡Querida familia!

Este domingo es el penúltimo domingo del año litúrgico. El domingo siguiente celebraremos la fiesta de Cristo Rey. Las lecturas hablan, lógicamente, de las «últimos tiempos» (Escatología): la venida del Señor, el Juez Divino. Para nosotros, los católicos, el fin del mundo no significa que Dios pierda el control sobre la tierra, sino que Dios lleve las cosas a un final triunfal.

Malaquías advierte del día venidero del Señor, cuando los orgullosos y malhechores serán consumidos, pero el sol de la justicia saldrá para quienes temen a Dios. A mediados del siglo V, Malaquías reprendió a los líderes por su impiedad y deshonestidad religiosa. Las palabras alentadoras del profeta Malaquías para los fieles que perseveran en el bien, aseguran que la compasión de Dios estará siempre con ellos, especialmente en el día del juicio. Malaquías es el último libro del Antiguo Testamento, la última palabra del Señor: enviará a Elías para darles una última oportunidad de conversión antes del Día del Señor y el Juicio Final.

En el Evangelio encontramos la versión de Lucas del discurso apocalíptico. El propósito de este estilo literario, repleto de imágenes y simbolismo, es asegurarnos que, si permanecemos firmes en la fe, podremos recibir el fin de todos los tiempos y el comienzo de la eternidad con confianza y alegría, en lugar de con temor y pavor. Jesús exige a sus seguidores tenacidad en la fe y la esperanza a pesar de sus sufrimientos.

Como señala el Catecismo, «Antes de la segunda venida de Cristo, la Iglesia debe pasar por una prueba final que sacudirá la fe de muchos creyentes. La persecución que acompaña su peregrinación terrenal desvelará el "misterio de la iniquidad" bajo la forma de un engaño religioso que ofrece a los hombres una aparente solución a sus problemas a costa de la apostasía de la verdad. El supremo engaño religioso es el del Anticristo, un pseudomesianismo por el cual el hombre se glorifica a sí mismo en lugar de Dios y de su Mesías encarnado. La Iglesia entrará en la gloria del reino solo a través de esta Pascua final, cuando siga a su Señor en su muerte y resurrección» (CIC 675, 677).

Hoy (33.º domingo) es la Jornada Mundial de los Pobres: ¿Por qué el Papa Francisco instituyó este día en 2017? Tras el Año de la Misericordia, el Papa expresó su deseo de dedicar un día para que, en todo el mundo, las comunidades cristianas se convirtieran en signos aún mayores de la caridad de Cristo hacia los necesitados.
